Message from the Federal Secretary

Severe floods of 2022, caused by a chain of climatic events, have dealt a serious blow to the country and educational institutions are one of the most affected by this calamity. With large-scale displacement and school closures, many students are facing disruption in their education. Nationwide, the risk of further increase in the number of out of school children (OOSC) seems imminent. However, our team at the Ministry is aware and sensitized about the challenges, and deliberating upon potential initiatives and projects which can minimize our losses. We will also be coordinating with the provinces to come up with plans to ensure access and continuation of educational activities. The Ministry is fully committed to overcome this emergency in all possible ways and ensure timely coordination and technical support. We are also engaging national and international educational partners to mitigate losses, bounce back with resilience and improve upon our systems and quality of learning.



FLOODS 2022 – MOFE&PT DONATIONS AND RELIEF ACTIVITIES

Unprecedented and heavy monsoon rains in 2022 led to massive floods across Pakistan. These floods have caused monumental damage to human life and physical properties. More than 1,559 people lost their lives, 12,850 injured, over 30 million people displaced, and one-third area of the country has been



inundated. For schools and children too, the loss is colossal. About 3.4 million children have been affected with the floods and over 18,000 schools have been damaged across the country. As a result, the entire education process has been disrupted. On 30th August, 2022, Federal Minister for Education and Professional Training Rana Tanveer Hussain, chaired a meeting of all heads of departments and organizations working under the Ministry to take stock of the situation and mobilize resources take immediate relief work and activities. Based on the decisions taken in the meeting, and given the size and outreach of several organizations, plans were chalked out and actions taken to collect cash funds, in-kind support, and channelize relief activities in several districts. The supplies, including tents, key food items,



medicines, daily-use need items were distributed and medical camps were established to address the spread of infectious diseases. An amount of Rs. 53.16 million has been collected with efforts of this Ministry's departments/organizations for Prime Minister's Flood Relief Fund 2022, while in kind contribution is of about Rs. 961 million.

Federal Directorate of Education (FDE), Islamabad

FDE mobilized its efforts to collect over Rs. 9.70 million cash, as voluntary donations, for flood affectees. Additionally, several relief items including medicines, edible goods and clothing were arranged through efforts of teacher and students across FDE schools for flood affected people. FDE was able to supply a total of ten (10) buses of relief items. School administration, teachers, students and their families were mobilized



to generate this sizeable support, based on their humanistic passion and great sense of volunteerism.

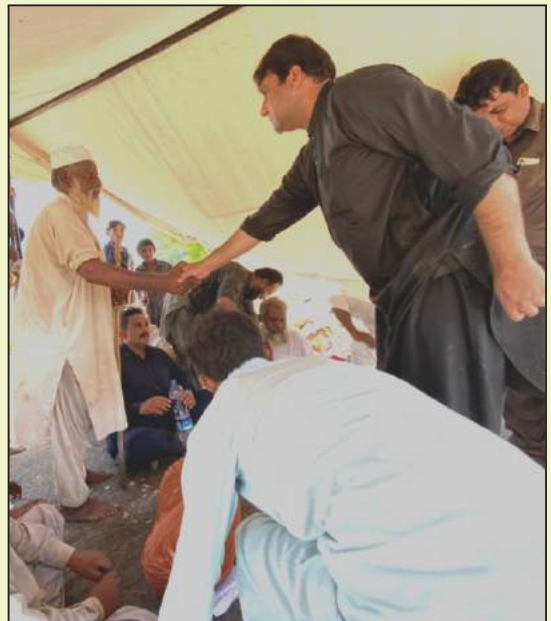


National Vocational and Technical Training Commission (NAVTTTC), Islamabad

NAVTTTC team under the leadership of its Executive Director started its efforts to collect funds in cash, mobilize collection of goods and key medical supplies and engaged their team at ground-level for effective distribution to the neediest pockets of flood affected people. Summatively, NAVTTTC arranged collection of amounts of over Rs. 5.64 million. 15 trucks loaded with necessary medicines, edible



goods and clothing have been donated to around 5,000 affected people. Appreciably, NAVTTTC engaged its training partners and supplied new clothes to these people. Moreover, in many locations, medical camps were also organized in many educational facilities around the groups of floods affected population.



Private Educational Institutions Regulatory Authority (PEIRA), Islamabad

In order to support the flood-relief operations and following the call of the Ministry to initiate immediate relief efforts, PEIRA's Islamabad chapter engaged with many private educational institutes for collection of funds and supplies. Students, teachers and management of the Private Educational Institutions (PEIs) and other NGOs, through coordinated efforts, took part in activities on a large scale. Through



this collaborative arrangement, the contributions in the form of goods, including edibles, shoes, clothes etc. (worth Rs. 2.50 million) were distributed through the National Commission for Human Development (NCHD) in affected areas. Also, direct cash support was also extended with support from the Ministry. PEIRA mobilized cash collection of over Rs. 2.60 million.

Federal Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (FBISE), Islamabad

FBISE also took a lead role in instantly taking actions and using its network to create sensitization about the damages of heavy rains and monstrous floods. Uniquely, FBISE mobilized its in-country stakeholders as well as those who are abroad, and undertook video conferencing sessions, physical meetings, fundraising events, and creating awareness in institutions for more collections and spread of relief activities. FBISE was also able to collect cash collections of around Rs. 3.547 million. It is worthwhile to mention that the Chairman FBISE announced full fee-waiver in registration as well as in examination service fees for the students and full waiver of affiliation fee of the institutions of flood affected areas. This was a befitting approach to provide monetary support and reflection of high moral standing and it was highly appreciated by the beneficiaries.



Higher Education Commission (HEC), Islamabad

In wake of recent floods in the country, Higher Education Commission (HEC) has sensitized the public and private sector universities to get involved at the grassroots level in relief efforts e.g. purchasing and distributing 90900 food parcels, 7,011,625 non-food items including medicines, and setting-up



of relief camps to provide immediate assistance to flood victims. HEC has divided the universities into four clusters covering engineering, agriculture, medicine, and livestock areas to work together and come up with suggestions to meet such challenges brought by climate change in the future. Furthermore, HEC has collected donations from different quarters of the HE fraternity and a cheque of Rs. 4.0 million was handed over to Ministry of Federal Education and Professional Training.



National Commission for Human Development (NCHD), Islamabad

NCHD took an initiative to help the people of Pakistan affected from devastating floods through the provision of emergency relief and early recovery assistance. NCHD provided emergency relief assistance in 52 districts initially hit by the devastating floods and then focused on 20 main flood affected districts in Province of Sindh, Punjab, Balochistan, and KP. NCHD team with the help of district staff and with its vast network of volunteers helped people on self help



basis through fund-raising from the local communities, via provision of Non Food Items and Food Items donated by different organizations and philanthropists.



Inter Board Committee of Chairman (IBCC), Islamabad

IBCC used its platform to engage all examination boards in Pakistan to take on relief efforts. IBCC mobilized these boards for wider awareness creation through IBCC Secretariat and its regional offices: flood camps were set up, physical meetings were held, virtual sessions undertaken, and public was mobilized through large banners seeking public support for relief work and supplies. Through deliberations, timely decisions on education and examinations were taken, which provided



relief to the students of flood affected areas. Notably, on the front of direct relief efforts, IBCC arranged more than six (06) trucks, for supply of food items, food ration (pulses, flour, sugar, etc.), tents, mosquito nets, medical supplies, juices, and clean water, which benefitted almost 4,000 families. IBCC continues to work with its partners to extend more relief work. IBCC contributed a cash collection of Rs. 1.02 million.

Directorate General of Religious Education (DGRE), Islamabad

Directorate General of Religious Education (DGRE), Islamabad has arranged cash donations of Rs. 0.54 million, and relief items for flood affected people.



Pakistan Girl Guides Association (PGGA), Islamabad

Pakistan Girl Guides Association was most effective in demonstrating truthfulness of its motto of “Be Prepared” and activating its vast network of empowered young girls and quickly jumping into relief work where it was most needed. Unique proposition on which the Girls Guide took lead was that girls and women get disproportionately affected during disasters. Keeping in mind the present flood situation, its relief, response and mitigation, PGGA has become an embodiment of active



girls and women participation due to its active relief work to respond to the floods. Main areas of Girl Guides' relief activities include Sibi, Jaffarabad, Loralai, Quetta in Balochistan province; D.G Khan, Ghazi Ghat, Taunsa, Choti Zareen, Choti Bala, Kot Chatha in Punjab province; Hyderabad (Qasimabad camp), Ghotki, Nausharo Feroz, Khairpur, Kimari District, Sheedi Goth, Sukkur in Sindh province; and Charsadda, Noshehra and Swat district in KP province.



Pakistan Institute of Fashion and Design (PIFD), Lahore

As per the directions of the Ministry of Federal Education and Professional Training, the Vice Chancellor of Pakistan Institute of Fashion and Design (PIFD), Lahore constituted a Committee to collect funds for flood victims. The Committee conducted a wide awareness campaign to the staff and faculty of PIFD and an amount of



Rs. 0.60 million was collected. The fund collection was lower due to ongoing semester break; however, the efforts to collect more funds is ongoing.

Pakistan Institute of Education (PIE), Islamabad

The PIE provided support through its technical input, cash collections and in-kind supplies distribution to help during the emergency situation of floods in various parts of the country. The newly-established PIE facilitated the Ministry of FE&PT in designing the template for assessment of flood damages and ongoing relief efforts undertaken by Provincial/Area Governments. PIE collected raw data from provisional & Area governments about flood affected schools, teachers and student to accelerate relief activities in coordination with Development Partners. Institutional relief efforts were started at PIE with awareness campaign and employees contributed by donating food, clothes, camps, crockery and other items at their individual level in collaboration with philanthropist organizations. The employees of PIE contributed cash an amount of over Rs. 0.30 million.

Federal College of Education (FCE), Islamabad

Under the guidance of the Federal Education Minister, the senior leadership of the Federal College of Education (FCE) chalked out plans to extend support in the relief operations of the Ministry for the flood affected people. FCE Student Council was mobilized for the task which in turn used a large support of students at the



institute to make collections of cash and in-kind support items. FCE Student Council also held an on-campus donation camp, which collected cash and supplies worth Rs. 1.00 Million, of which Rs. 100,000 were collected in the form of cash and Rs. 900,000 in the form of supplies. Additionally, FCE collaborated with Al-Khidmat Foundation, and the collected goods and donations were sent at the Camps in Bahrainin and Swat in KPK.



National Textile University (NTU), Faisalabad

National Textile University also undertook initiatives to collect funds and provide additional relief support. The institute collected and deposited over Rs. 0.15 million in the Relief account of the Higher Education Commission, Islamabad and additionally around Rs. 150,000 in the Ministry's relief account. Besides cash

collection, one large truck and another small mini-truck loaded with food and clothing items were sent through the Deputy Commissioner Office, Faisalabad after making collections in-kind from its partners and students.

Allama Iqbal Open University (AIOU), Islamabad

AIOU used its vast and extended network of Regional Centers across Pakistan to mobilize its relief efforts. The university management coordinated its efforts through large teams in many areas and took initiatives to provide relief by delivering medical assistance, food items, household necessities etc. This was widely helpful for many people who needed such supplies and services. The efforts of AIOU have been extended in many areas. The relief activities have actively been undertaken in various areas of districts: D.G. Khan, Sukkur, Moro, Larkana, Hyderabad, Thatta, D.M. Jamali, Quetta, D.I. Khan, Swat and Mardan. AIOU made a sizeable contribution of Rs. 3.7 million towards flood relief.



Quaid-i-Azam University (QAU), Islamabad

In the aftermath of devastating floods, Quaid-i-Azam University Islamabad has carried out significant flood relief activities. Three consignments carrying ration, grocery and essential items of livelihood were dispatched to the flood hit areas. The students and volunteers of QAU welfare society conducted donations and the amount of Rs. 2.6 million was submitted to the Ministry of Education and Federal Training.



National Fertilizer Corporation Institute of Engineering and Technology (NFC-IET), Multan

NFC Institute of Engineering & Technology, Multan arranged a gracious cash donation of Rs. 12.2 million for flood affectees and distributed relief items in floods affected areas .



National Fertilizer Corporation (NFC) Institute of Engineering & Fertilizer Research (IEFR), Faisalabad

NFC-Institute of Engineering & Fertilizer Research (NFC-IEFR), Faisalabad has arranged cash donations of Rs. 1.8 million, ration packets & life's essentials worth Rs. 0.50 million flood affectees.
